WHAT IS OUR MISSION STATEMENT?

It is the mission of the Bakersfield College Department of Public Safety to serve the campus community, safeguard lives and property, and maintain an environment in which learning can take place. To fulfill this mission, the Department of Public Safety provides a variety of public safety services for students, faculty and the community.

The Department of Public Safety is staffed by state-

certified Officers. Public Safety Officers patrol the campus on foot and bicycles as well as vehicles providing security and enforcing parking regulations of the Kern Community College District.

Public Safety services include crime prevention, lost and found property control, emergency/disaster management, crime and accident reporting, parking control, and security escort services.

REPORTING CRIMES

Bakersfield College encourages victims of crimes to report incidents immediately to the Department of Public Safety regardless of how insignificant the crime may appear. To report a crime, a victim or witness need only call 395-4554 or 395-4555.

A Public Safety Officer will respond as quickly as possible to take the information and investigate the incident. College administrators receive reports about crimes and incidents on a regular basis.

ACTUAL CRIME AT BAKERSFIELD COLLEGE

The Bakersfield College crime rate is not extensive, however, like any other community there are incidents the community, students, faculty and employees need to know and be aware. The following chart illustrates the actual number of

crimes reported to Bakersfield College Department of Public Safety in the [past three calendar years](#).

CRIME STATISTICS COMPARISON

Bakersfield College Department of Public Safety patrols four campuses; the main campus at 1801 Panorama Dr., a residential neighborhood, the Weill Institute located in the downtown business section at 2100 Chester Ave., a satellite program being held at Stockdale High School at 2800 Buena Vista Rd., and the Bakersfield College Delano Campus at 1450 Timmons Ave in Delano California, both located in residential areas.

Numbers in the [three-year comparison](#) shown in this booklet are based on reports completed by Bakersfield College Department of Public Safety and cover the [calendar year from January 1 to December 31](#). The figures represent the number of investigations and completed reports for the criminal activities listed.

CRIME PREVENTION

Bakersfield College has taken steps to prevent crime. These efforts include:

- 24-hour patrols – includes walking patrols and bicycle patrol by Public Safety Officers
- Easy access emergency [“Code Blue” telephones](#) which call directly to 395-4554 or 395-4555.
- Public Safety Officers are dispatched by the Departments base radio.
- Burglar alarms in key areas.
- Escort service for students, faculty and employees upon request
- Campus Camera System - CCTV
- Cadet Program

Bakersfield College continues to increase efforts to prevent crime. We have improved our night lighting in areas that have student traffic after dark. There will be several Public Safety Officers on foot that will give quick accessibility to trouble areas. A cadet

program is established to assist in providing a safer environment for the college community, and at the same time a professional service to students, faculty members, staff and visitors.

Each student, faculty member and employee plays a key role in efforts to prevent crime on campus. Be cautious, careful and alert to reduce the risk of theft or incidents that might compromise your safety. It is an unfortunate fact that criminal incidents of all types occur on college campuses. Bakersfield College Public Safety Department will make public

the nature of crimes and how frequently they occur. Bakersfield College follows this practice because we believe that reporting this information to the public increases community awareness of the importance of taking steps to prevent criminal activity.

BAKERSFIELD COLLEGE SEXUAL ASSAULT POLICY

Per Education Code 67385

Bakersfield College recognizes that sexual assault is a very serious issue, and will not tolerate acts of sexual assault on campus or at any College sanctioned event. Sexual assault includes, but is not limited to, rape, sodomy, oral copulation, and penetration with a foreign object, sexual battery, or threat of sexual assault. The College and the Bakersfield Police Department will investigate all allegations of sexual assault with cooperation and consent of the victim. In addition, the College will also make provisions to assist the victim in securing support services, including medical aid and counseling services through our strategic partners listed below. Victims of sexual assault are entitled to change academic schedules or classes if so requested and if such changes are reasonably available. **The identity of victims of sexual assault can be made confidential pursuant to California Penal Code Section 293.**

In all cases of sexual assault, we recommend collaboration with the Bakersfield Police Department to seek criminal charges, make arrest, and/or seek and emergency protective order. Furthermore, victims have the option of filing civil suits to recover damages resulting from the sexual assault. Disciplinary proceedings at the College will be administered by the Vice President of Learning Services or his/her designee in accordance with the Bakersfield College policy on Student Conduct and Due Process. Both the victim and the suspect are afforded equal opportunity to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding and each will be informed of the outcome. Students found culpable for sexual assault may be arrested, expelled, suspended, placed on probation or given a lesser sanction for good cause, depending on the gravity of the offense and consistent with due process procedures.

If you become a victim of sexual assault, on or off campus, do the following:

- Get to a safe place --- Call 911 to contact Emergency Personnel or request Medical Aid
- Call 395-4555 to contact the Department of Public Safety or College staff.
- Contact someone you can trust to support you.
- Make every effort to preserve any physical evidence
- Do not wash, shower, bathe, douche, or change, destroy or discard your clothing.
- Do not clean up or re-arrange the area of the crime scene.
- A police officer will arrange for forensic medical services, as appropriate.

CLEARY ACT AND CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS

TITLE 34, VOLUME 3, PAGE 476 CFR # 2 (B) SECTION 4 (I)

Authority of Public Safety Officers

Bakersfield College Public Safety officers have been granted administrative authority by the Board of Trustees and College President to investigate, apprehend, and arrest anyone involved in illegal acts on campus. If a student commits minor offenses involving District or College rules and

regulations, the Department of Public Safety may refer the individual to the Dean of Students, located in Campus Center # 4. Other more serious offenses of District or College rules and regulations may also be investigated and handled by the Department of Public Safety.

What is the Cleary Act?

The **Jeanne Cleary Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act**, codified at 20 USC 1092 (f) as a part of the **Higher Education Act of 1965**, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. All public and private institutions of postsecondary education participating in federal student aid programs are subject to it. Violators can be "fined" up to \$27,500 by the U.S. Department of Education, the agency charged with enforcement of the Act and where complaints of alleged violations should be made, or face other enforcement action.

The Cleary Act, originally enacted by the Congress and signed into law by President George Bush in 1990 as the **Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990**, was championed by Howard & Connie Cleary after their daughter Jeanne was murdered at Lehigh University in 1986. They also founded the non-profit Security of Campus, Inc. in 1987. Amendments to the Act in 1998 renamed it in memory of Jeanne Cleary.

Annual Report

Schools have to publish an annual report every year by October 1st that [contains 3 years worth of campus crime statistics](#) and certain security policy statements including sexual assault policies which assure basic victims' right, the law enforcement authority of campus police and where students should go to report crimes. The report is to be made available automatically to all current students and employees while prospective students and employees are to be notified of its existence and afforded an opportunity to request a copy. Schools can comply using the Internet so long as the required recipients are notified and provided the exact Internet address where the report can be found and paper copies are available upon request. [A copy of the statistics must also be provided to the U.S. Department of Education.](#)

Crime Statistics

Each school must disclose crime statistics for the campus, unobstructed public areas immediately adjacent to or running through the campus, and certain non-campus facilities including Greek housing and remote classrooms. The statistics must be gathered from campus police or security, local law enforcement, and other school officials who have "significant responsibility for student and campus activities" such as student judicial affairs directors. Professional mental health and religious counselors are exempt from reporting obligation, but may refer patients to a confidential reporting system which the school has to indicate whether or not it has.

Crimes are reported in the following 7 major categories, with several sub-categories: 1. Criminal Homicide broken down by a.) Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter and b.) Negligent Manslaughter. 2. Sex Offenses broken down by a.) Forcible Sex Offenses (includes rape) and b.) Non-forcible Sex Offenses; 3. Robbery 4. Aggravated Assault; 5. Burglary; 6. Motor Vehicle Theft; and 7. Arson.

Schools are also required to report the following three types of incidents if they result in either an arrest or

disciplinary referral: 1. Liquor Law Violations; 2. Drug Law Violations; and 3. Illegal Weapons Possession. If both an arrest and referral are made only the arrest is counted.

The statistics are also broken down geographically into “on campus,” “Residential facilities for students on campus, “non-campus buildings, or “on public property” such as streets and sidewalks. Schools can use a map to denote these areas. The report must also indicate if any of the reported incidents, or any other crime involving bodily injury, was a “hate crime.”

Access to Timely Information

Schools are also required to provide “timely warnings” and a separate more extensive public crime log. It is these requirements which are most likely to affect the day to day lives of students. The timely warning requirement is somewhat subjective and is only triggered when the school considers a crime to pose an ongoing “threat to students and employees: while the log records all incidents reported to the campus police or security department.

Timely warnings cover a broader source of reports (campus police or security, other campus officials, and off-campus law enforcement) than the crime log but are linked to those crime categories required in the annual report. The crime log includes only incidents reported to the campus police or security department, but covers all crimes not just those required in the annual report, meaning crimes like theft are included in the log. State crime definitions may be used.

Schools that maintain a police or security department are required to disclose in the public crime log “any crime that occurred on campus...or within the patrol jurisdiction of the campus police or the campus security department and is reported to the campus police or security department.” The log is required to include the “nature, date, time, and general location of each crime” as well as its disposition if known. Incidents are to be included within two business days but certain limited information may be withheld to protect victim confidentiality, ensure the integrity of ongoing investigations, or to keep a suspect from fleeing. Only the most limited information necessary may be withheld and even then it must be released “once the adverse effect...is no longer likely to occur.”

The log must be publicly available during normal business hours. This means that in addition to students and employees the general public such as parents or members of the local press may access it. Logs remain open for 60 days and subsequently must be available within 2 business day of a request.

All criminal offenses such as murder, rape, assault, robbery and auto theft are reported to the Bakersfield Police Department and joint investigative efforts with investigators from the College and the Police Department may be deployed to solve these serious felony crimes. The prosecution of all criminal offenses, both felony and misdemeanor, are conducted at the Superior Court of Kern County.

Federal Bureau of Investigation Uniform Crime Reporting and National Incident-Based Reporting System Crime Definitions

Excerpted from the Implementing regulations of the “Jeanne Cleary Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act” (Originally the Campus Security Act) originally published in the Federal Register on April 29, 1994 (Vol. 59, No. 82) and November 1, 1999 (Vol. 64, No. 210).

The following definitions are to be used for reporting the crimes listed in 34 CFR sec. 668.46 (previously 668.47) in accordance with the Federal Bureau of Investigation’s Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The definitions for murder, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, weapon law violation, drug abuse violations and liquor law violations are excerpted from the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook. The definitions of forcible and non-forcible sex offenses are excerpted from the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook.

Crime Definitions from the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook

Arson

Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Criminal Homicide-Manslaughter by Negligence

The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Criminal Homicide-Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter

The willful(non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Robbery

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and /or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault

An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (it is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Burglary

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Classify as a motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding.)

Weapon Law Violations

The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations

Violation of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Liquor Law Violations

The violations of law or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor, maintaining lawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Sex Offenses Definitions From the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Sex Offenses-Forcible

Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

- A. Forcible Rape-The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).
- B. Forcible Sodomy-Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- C. Sexual Assault With An Object-The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and /or against the at person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- D. Forcible Fondling-The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and /or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Sex Offenses-Non-forcible

Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

- 1. Incest-Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape-Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

The Department of Public Safety's jurisdiction extends only to the boundaries of District owned and operated property. Any crime that occurs outside the boundaries of the College should be reported immediately to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

The Department of Public Safety is responsible for security and emergency response at Bakersfield College, Delano Center, Timmons Center (Delano), Weill Institute and Stockdale High School. Trained Public Safety personnel staff the department. Public Safety Officers work closely with the Bakersfield Police Department who has a designated officer for the campus.

Public Safety Officers currently retain a civilian status during their employment at Bakersfield College. However, all Officers undergo a rigorous four-week training program wherein daily/weekly progress reviews are completed by a Sr. Officer and reviewed by a Sergeant and the Chief of Public Safety. Additionally, all officers are trained and certified under the California Department of Consumer Affairs. Bakersfield College Public Safety Officers act as private citizens for the College in all law enforcement matters.

All officers, full and part-time, receive on-going training. Training includes pertinent information such as legal updates, crime prevention strategies, defensive tactics, ethnic and cultural sensitivity, CPR, and First Aid

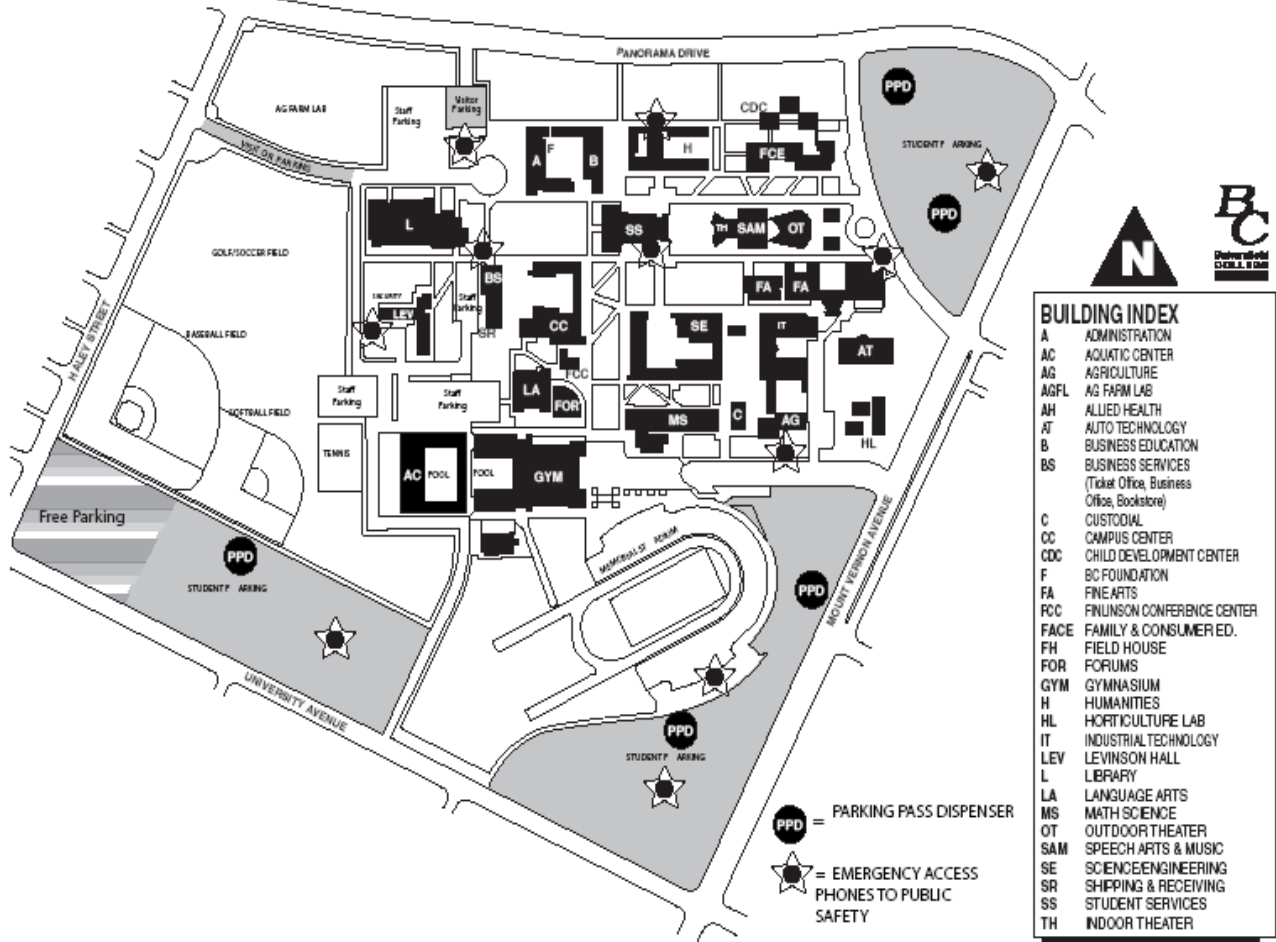

MEGAN'S LAW

'Megan's Law'

In 1994, seven year old Megan Kanka was tricked into Jesse Timmendequas' house in Hamilton Township, New Jersey. Jesse Timmendequas, the neighbor, was a convicted sex offender with two prior convictions for sexual abuse of a child, but no one in the neighborhood knew that. Once Megan was inside, Timmendequas raped and murdered her. Eventually, Timmendequas was convicted for the murder of Megan Kanka.

Following the death of Megan a grass roots movement led to the removal of the prohibition of law enforcement notifying the public of the presence of serious and high-risk sex offenders living in their community. On May 17, 1996, President Clinton signed the Federal "Megan's Law". This law permitted law enforcement to release relevant information to protect the public from sexually violent offenders.

Reporting Year 2010 - CMC

For the past fifty plus years California has maintained a record of those individuals convicted of sexually related crimes. In 1995 California instituted the Child Molester Identification Line, which was expanded in 1996 with the passage of California's Megan's Law. This law, allows for the first time, public access to information on serious and high-risk sex offenders.

In California sexual offenders are classified by the Department of Justice into one of three sexual offender categories, **High Risk**, **Serious**, or **Other**. The criteria for each of the categories are defined in the California Penal Code.

In summation, a High-Risk registrant is a Serious sex offender who has been convicted of a combination of offenses including a violent sex offense and other crimes. High-Risk status must be determined and verified by the Department of Justice. Generally, these "High-Risk" sex registrants pose a greater threat of re-offending based on their prior criminal acts.

A Serious Sex Offender is required to register with law enforcement if they have been convicted of:

- Assault with intent to commit specified sex offenses
- Rape
- Sodomy
- Lewd and lascivious conduct with a child or dependent adult
- Oral copulation
- Continuous sexual abuse of a child
- Foreign object penetration
- Child molestation
- Kidnapping with intent to commit specified sex offenses
- Felony sexual battery
- Felony enticement of a child for purposes of prostitution
- Abduction of a child for purposes of prostitution

The Other sexual offender categories consist of persons convicted of possession of pornography, spousal rape, indecent exposure, or misdemeanor sexual battery - OR - juveniles adjudicated in juvenile court. Persons falling within the Other category are NOT subject to public disclosure.

The law is not intended to punish the offender and specifically prohibits using the information to harass or commit any crime against the offender. It recognizes that public safety is best served when registered sex offenders are not concealing their location.

It is imperative that pro-active efforts are taken by each citizen to educate and protect themselves and loved ones against crime. The Attorney General now provides the public with Internet access to detailed information on registered sex offenders.

This expanded access allows the public for the first time to use their personal computers to view information on sex offenders required to register with local law enforcement under California's Megan's Law.

Brief Review of Parking Regulations

Bakersfield College Department of Public Safety Parking Rules and Regulations

Please refer to the Bakersfield College parking lot map for the location.

Traffic and parking regulations shall be enforced at all times. Park according to posted parking signs and these instructions only. Violators may receive citations. Parking permits are not valid unless displayed in the proper manner on your vehicle the (lower LEFT side of the front windshield).

Semester permits: You can obtain your student semester permit at: www.thepermitstore.com. The permit must be attached to the inside of the lower left (drivers) side of the vehicles windshield.

Towing: Multiple parking violations which are unpaid may result in the DMV holds on the registration of the vehicle.

Designated parking zones on campus are: Please refer to the Bakersfield College parking lot map for the location.

Student Parking: Student parking is available in three major parking areas on the main campus; Student lots on the main campus are located on the SE, SW, and NE corners. Permits are not valid unless displayed in/on lower drivers side front windshield, visible for inspection of number and date of issue, from outside the vehicle.

Free parking: The free parking area is at the FAR corner of University and Mt. Vernon. It is directly behind the Baseball field area. This area ends with a **white line painted on the asphalt surface** near the recycle area. Please refer to the Bakersfield College parking lot map for the location.

Permit Dispensers: Daily parking permit dispensers have been installed in every BC campus student parking lot. The daily parking fee is \$1. Daily permits are available in all student parking lots, and may be obtained by inserting coins or dollars into parking permit dispenser. Student daily permits are valid only in the student lots and may be used in any student parking lot on date of purchase. Please refer to the Bakersfield College parking lot map for the location.

Guest/Visitor Parking: Guest, temporary or other special parking permits may be requested at the Department of Public Safety, Levinson Hall (West Wing). "Staff Parking Permits Required" parking lots on the Main Campus, Delano Center and Weill Institute. Please refer to the Bakersfield College parking lot map for the location

Limited time parking: Forty-five minute visitor parking is available for visitors and guests only.

Handicapped Parking: Handicapped students may obtain a handicapped-parking permit which is valid only in the BC campus handicapped zones. Temporarily handicapped students may obtain a temporary permit with a written authorization from a physician from the Department of Public Safety, in Levinson Hall (West Wing).

It is our hope that by making you aware of campus parking regulations, you will avoid receiving a parking violation citation.

A complete copy of the Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations for Bakersfield College may be

obtained from the Department of Public Safety at no charge.

Special parking problems or requests should be brought to the attention of the Chief of Public Safety, located at Levinson Hall (West Wing), or call 395-4554. Please report all lost or stolen parking permits as soon as possible to the Department of Public Safety at 395-4554.

Authority

State of California. Vehicle Code. Notice of Parking Violation. 40202. (c) Once the issuing officer has prepared the notice of parking violation and has attached it to the vehicle as provided in subdivision (a), the officer shall file notice with the processing agency. Any person, including the issuing officer and any member of the officer's department or agency, or any peace officer who alters, conceals, modifies, or destroys, or causes to be altered, concealed, modified, nullified, or destroys the face of the remaining original or any copy of a citation that was retained by the officer, for any reason, before it is filed with the processing agency or with a person authorized to receive the deposit of the parking penalty, is guilty of a misdemeanor. If, after a copy of the notice of parking violation is attached to the vehicle, the issuing officer determines that, in the interest of justice, the notice of parking violation should be dismissed, the issuing agency may recommend, in writing, that the charges be dismissed. The recommendation shall cite the reason for the recommendation and shall be filed with the processing agency. If the processing agency makes a finding that there are grounds for dismissal, the finding shall be entered on the record and the notice of parking violation shall be canceled pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) or Section 40215. "Under no circumstances shall a personal relationship with any officer, public official, or law enforcement agency be grounds for dismissal."
